
Our advocacy for good decision-making by the Colorado Legislature began with the start of the Colorado Legislative Session in January. You will read in our report about our efforts to support protecting the important habitat stamp program (critical to fund Colorado Parks and Wildlife projects that support wildlife habitat protection and development), and opposing efforts that would threaten using good wildlife science, and hunting and angling as important tools in managing wildlife policy and use decisions.

You will also read about how the CWF staff interacts with multiple State, Federal, County, and local organizations to help achieve good policy decisions, wildlife corridor and habitat protection and development that support the continuing and growing demand for the wide variety of quality outdoor recreational opportunities that make Colorado such a great place to live.

The Colorado Wildlife Federation continues to be a leading outdoor educational organization that promotes new participants in the outdoors through our Becoming an Outdoors Woman program and the Hispanic "Dia de Pesca" youth angling opportunities. As a non-profit 501(c)(3) Organization, the Colorado Wildlife Federation accomplishes an amazing amount of advocacy and conservation planning with the organizations we partner with. We depend on grants, donations, and some specific project funding to support our staff and the great work they do .

Our Pillars

Pillar 1: Advocacy

CWF works with elected and appointed officials, as well as other nonprofits to promote sound wildlife habitat and management policy. CWF is a leader in seeking and finding common ground among wildlife enthusiasts, sportsmen and women who fish and hunt, and other outdoor recreators.

The issues impact the public who care about Colorado's wildlife and want their children and grandchildren to be able to enjoy this irreplaceable fish and wildlife resource.

Pillar 2: Educational Programming

CWF's flagship program is Becoming an Outdoors-Woman (BOW). BOW is a national education program that strives to make women more comfortable in, and more aware of the outdoors as they learn or improve outdoors skills in a fun setting. Courses include fly fishing, outdoor photography, archery, navigation, birding, stream ecology, and more.

We are proud to serve as a founding partner in Hispanic Fishing Day / Dia de Pesca. We offer local families a memorable fishing experiences together with Colorado Hispanic Chamber, Denver Parks and Recreation and Colorado Parks and Wildlife.

Sept 2024-Aug 2025 Advocacy Results

Balancing Wildlife Needs and Recreation Desires

- Integrating wildlife habitat needs into outdoor recreation projects: Our Executive Director serves on the steering committee of the Outside 285 regional partnership that spans areas of Jefferson, Douglas, Clear Creek, and Park counties. We have worked actively in this regional partnership to develop a plan for eliminating trails along a riparian corridor at Indian Creek and routing a new trail that avoids wildlife habitat. We also are protecting bighorn sheep in South Park by rerouting certain alpine trails in South Park.
- **Conservation in the <u>San Luis Valley:</u>** She also serves on the wildlife mapping and the climate committees of the <u>San Luis Valley Great Outdoors!</u> (SLVGO!) regional partnership to ensure an effective balance between outdoor recreational desires and important wildlife habitat conservation.
- Ensuring wildlife conservation receives equal footing with outdoor recreation: She has served on the state of Colorado's Outdoors Strategy Steering and Technical Committees that have developed a collaborative vision for climate-resilient conservation and restoration, sustainable outdoor recreation, and coordinated planning and funding. She also sits on the GOCO/CPW scoring committee to recommend grant awards for regional partnerships.

Testifying on All Wildlife Bills in State General Assembly

CWF testified in support of the following bills during the 2025 legislative session.

Passed and enacted:

- Bill creating a study of state trust lands and stewardship trust lands (HB 25-1332) with a working group that will make recommendations on or before September 1, 2026 to the Governor, House Agriculture, Water and Natural Resources Committee, the Senate Agriculture, and Natural Resources Committee and the State Land Board and its Executive Director.
- **Bill continuing the Colorado Habitat Stamp program (SB25-049):** clean bill that removes the sunset and continues this important program indefinitely. The program began in 2006 and has operated smoothly, investing funds to benefit wildlife habitat and access to habitats through landowner conservation easements, public easements and fee title transfers.
- Bill requiring local government review of specific fencing projects on Sangre de Cristo land grant lands in the San Luis Valley. (HB 25-1023). This new law is important as local government review would likely enable elk, deer and pronghorn on these lands to continue safely crossing.
- Bill classifying bison that wander into Colorado from Utah as big game (SB 25-053). All bison had been classified as agriculture.

The following bill did not pass:

• Bill to prevent motor vehicle collisions and protect Colorado's wildlife (HB 25-1303) was intended to help fund infrastructure tools at highest risk wildlife highway crossings. It had passed the House but failed in the Senate Finance Committee. It was an important bill with dedicated bill sponsors. We hope to try again.

Sept 2024-Aug 2025 Advocacy Results

Wildlife Management Challenges and Progress

- Commenting on important wildlife policy before the CPW Commission and the Energy and Carbon Management Commission: CWF makes important public comment on at least one policy issue at each CPW Commission meeting. CWF participated in the successful rule makings before the Energy and Carbon Management Commission in 2023, 2024, and 2025 to adopt CPW's High Priority Habitat map updates.
- Making wildlife management recommendations: CWF participated in 10 federal land use planning processes for managing wildlife on public lands in Colorado.
- Conserving wildlife habitats on public lands: As Colorado's needs rise for solar energy installations on our public lands, we stand firm to advocate appropriate siting of facilities that safeguards important wildlife habitats. CWF provided extensive input to the Colorado Energy Office and Department of Natural Resources to minimize conflicts and promote avoidance and minimization of potential impacts to wildlife resources.
- Planning the State Wildlife Action Plan summit: In October 2025, we are proud to host a
 Summit to galvanize support and ideas among conservation leaders for implementation of
 Colorado's State Wildlife Action Plan. This Plan focuses on species of greatest conservation need and
 greatest information need.
- **Supporting aquatic restoration projects:** CWF is bringing to life important aquatic restoration projects through compelling story telling.
- **Participating in specialist workgroups:** Our Executive Director has been appointed to the State Trust Lands Conservation and Recreation Work Group via a formal letter from the Majority Leader, pursuant to law that enacted HB 25-1332. Other workgroups have included working to find common ground among stakeholders in CPW's furbearer working group and in its beaver management planning stakeholders process.
- **Preventing wildlife fragmentation:** CWF led the push to avoid wildlife fragmentation and gains stream and wetlands buffers for iconic South Park during the BLM's decade-long Eastern Colorado resource management planning process.
- Engaging with sportsmen to protect wildlife: Tim Emery, CWF Issues Committee Chairperson was appointed to the Sportsperson's Rountable in February of 2025. CPW depends on feedback and advice from our state's hunters and anglers to make the best decisions about the management of fish, wildlife, and habitat. To support this effort, CPW convenes a statewide Sportsperson's Roundtable and holds regional sportsperson meetings.

Shaping the Media Narrative

• Interviews for Colorado newscasts: CWF has been interviewed for Colorado newscasts on policy matters such as Colorado BLM's Big Game Resource Management Plan Amendment which has synchronized its oil and gas rules with Colorado's wildlife protections in the Colorado's Energy and Carbon Management Commission rules. Another interview was how BLM's national oil and gas reform rules package would impact its Colorado leases. As CWF and NWF plan our Wildlife Action Plan Summit, our Deputy Director Madison was interviewed by Public News Service and our Executive Director Suzanne wrote an OpEd to explain the importance of the Colorado State Wildlife Action Plan.

Showcase: 2025 BOW Weekend

The BOW Weekend is an opportunity for women at any fitness level, 18 years or older, to learn hands-on outdoor skills. No experience is necessary! BOW is a supportive environment for learning, making lifelong friends, and having fun.

In 2025 we hosted the event at Easterseals Rocky Mountain Village in Empire, CO for 63 attendees, including 10 Bridges to BOW scholarship participants.

Attendees learn skills like archery, plant identification, hunting education, fly fishing, self-defense, map and compass reading, and LOTS more! All meals and lodging are provided for the weekend.

This weekend event is our most popular BOW program, with women coming from all over the country to participate.

The weekend's instructors are volunteers. Some are employed in the fields they teach, others are experts in their subjects, and several are Colorado Parks and Wildlife employees with years of experience in the flora and fauna of Colorado.

While many of our instructors are women, we do also have a few excellent male instructors who have long been dedicated to providing the very best instruction for our attendees.
